 - i. Interim Superintendent Neu reported the following:
 - Nancy Neu reported that she is still serving as Interim Superintendent, and along with MCOE Interim Assistant Supt. Trahan Trahan, is supporting the District on behalf of Marin County Superintendent of Schools Mary Jane Burke.
 - There is discussion countywide about the shortage of substitute teachers and how best to address the situation. All substitutes are encouraged to register through MCOE so Livescans, TB tests and other requirements can be streamlined. MCOE has committed to enhancing recruitment efforts for expediting the

onboarding process so substitutes can move in quickly. John Carroll, incoming Marin County Supt. of Schools, is working on a project with COM and Sonoma State University to attract young adults to a career path in education.

b. 2021-22 CAASPP Scores Report

- i. Principal Snekkevik reported that scores were released on October 24 for the standardized tests that students took last May. She said the CAASPP test is one data point of many, but it is nonetheless important. The scores can swing rapidly with just 21 students tested, six of whom have learning disabilities and six who are English Learners. Those factors are embedded in the data. Overall, the students' scores were lower than the county average, but higher than the statewide average in language arts and math. Principal Snekkevik said the students' science scores are worth celebrating, having ranked higher than both the county and the state. She highlighted ongoing local benchmark assessments as tools for addressing learning loss. Three times a year, teachers give local assessments in reading and math, and they review and monitor historical progress of every child. They provide bonus support for any child who needs it. Students are offered extended learning opportunities, and the district partners with San Geronimo Valley Community Center for student access to afterschool homework support, social activities and aftercare. Principal Snekkevik said there is a strong focus on the social and emotional health of all students, and making sure they are cared for emotionally. The trustees thanked Principal Snekkevik for her report.

a. Consider Approval to Establish the Role of a Superintendent/Principal Position for the Remainder of 2022-23 and 2023-24 *Discussion:* Board President Doss reported discussions with County Supt.

of Schools Mary Jane Burke about the proposed new Superintendent/Principal position. She said Nancy Neu has agreed to work with and support the three new superintendent/principals in Marin, and will meet with them regularly. Additionally, MCOE Interim Assistant Supt. Trahan and Deputy Supt. Jon Lenz will provide any needed support. Interim Supt. Neu said the recommendation is for the position to take effect beginning January, 2023 through the end of the 2023-24 school year, and to be reevaluated after that. She said the new role is for a specific individual, and that it would not be an established dual role if a new principal is hired. She said the additional salary cost will come from the general budget, and that it roughly equates to the funding the county gets in support of the rural districts. Principal Snekkevik said she is honored by the Board's consideration of her for the new superintendent/principal role.
